Along with the inkstone, brush, and paper, the inkstick was essential to a scholar's practice of calligraphy and brush painting. Made of soot and animal glue that was pressed into a mold to harden, these solid inks were sometimes infused with incense or essences of clove, sandalwood or other fragrant oils. To reconstitute the ink, the scholar would grind the inkstick against an inkstone with a small quantity of water to produce liquid ink. Qing Dynasty scholars surrounded themselves by beauty and inspiration; even the most humble of their tools was no exception. Continued...



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Shaped into a fan, this inkstone is embossed with the image of a scholar walking in an artfully landscaped garden. This shape is associated with one of the Eight Immortals, symbolizing benevolence and good wishes.



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
